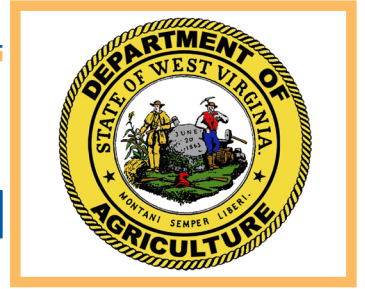

in the different soils that these two locations offer. We will then share that information with our farmers so they can make informed decisions about future crop planting and production.



Potato plants are blooming at the WVDA farm at Huttonsville. A variety of breeds have been planted on 15 acres to see which ones yield the best product. West Virginians consume more potatoes than any other type of fresh produce, so the test plots at Huttonsville can provide information to help West Virginia farmers grow more potatoes that can be sold and consumed within the state.

pricing and given that transportation is a significant part of the overall costs associated with imports, we see this as a real opportunity to be a factor in the market.

The possibilities for crop growth also extend to several other types of vegetables and we are currently exploring those options.

POTATOES ARE GROWING

On recent trips to Mason and Randolph counties I checked on our potato projects at Lakin and Huttonsville.

The plants were in full bloom, looked very healthy and we are anticipating a productive harvest at both locations later this year.

Fourteen different varieties are in the ground at both sites so we can determine which ones will thrive

When it comes to vegetables being purchased in our state, potatoes top the list and we just don't grow very many of them here right now.

We intend to change that and we've already invested, and will continue to invest our time on an aggressive multi-faceted effort that will significantly increase potato production in our state over the next few years.

We have distributors that will buy West Virginia grown potatoes if we can produce the same quality we currently import from Idaho and other states. I believe we can certainly achieve that. The other component is

Virginia raised beef and the tour certainly helped to heighten awareness for our state cattle producers.

Again, I hope you all will seek out your local cattle men and women and buy your beef from them whenever possible.

Inductees for 2014 are: Robert Barnitz, Richard McClung, Mark Alan Metz, Roscoe Plumley and Jack Sturgill.

Enshrinement in the WVAFHF is reserved for those individuals, businesses, organizations, institutions and foundations that have made outstanding contributions to the establishment, development, advancement and improvement of the agricultural, forestry and family life of West Virginia.

Brief bios of the new members (Full bios will be available at www.wvagriculture.org/WVAFHF/index.htm):

ROBERT (BOB) BARNITZ grew up in Meigs County, Ohio, and has been involved in family-oriented agriculture since his childhood. His father was a produce dealer. In 1970, Bob and wife Corena went into business in Mason with two backyard greenhouses and a roadside produce stand. By the 1980s, Bob's Market and Greenhouses had acquired a fleet of trucks and began shipping to companies along the East Coast. In the 1990s, Bob's formed an exclusive partnership with Ball Seed Company to produce plug seedlings. In 1998, Bob's produced 7 million plugs for Ball Seed. In 2013, the company produced 88 million. The company expanded in the 1990s, opening new retail locations throughout the region. In 2005, Bob's opened market in Atlanta. The company also became a rooting station for Dommen USA. From his humble truck farm beginnings, Bob's has grown to encompass 20 acres of greenhouses and five retail locations with \$14 million in annual gross sales and 130 full-time employees. Bob's is the largest greenhouse operation east of the Mississippi River. With the help of his wife and five sons, Bob's Market and Greenhouses has become one of the leaders in the United States nursery industry.

RICHARD MCCLUNG is a native West Virginian from Greenbrier County. He graduated from West Virginia University with a BS in Animal Science in 1964. After his graduation, McClung became an American Angus Association Lifetime Member in 1964, and he worked as the Greenbrier Stock Farm Manager from 1964 to 1969.

In 1978, he became a Managing Partner of Wehrmann Angus in New Market, Virginia and remained in that position until 2012. Mr. McClung worked with scholars at Virginia Tech and the American Angus Association researching beef cattle reproduction. The research he helped with eventually led to improved heat synchronization methods and the establishment of the milk Estimated Progeny Difference, a tool that helps producers make more informed decisions concerning the amount of milk that calves need. Mr. McClung has also actively encouraged and provided service toward the education of youth in the community. He has hosted county 4-H and FFA livestock judging teams, co-funded the West Virginia Junior Angus Association for the Eastern Regional Jr. Angus Association Show, and provided college students with six month internship opportunities in the cattle industry. Mr. McClung has donated heifers to be sold to benefit of the education of youth and independent research in the cattle industry through the Angus Foundation. The amount of these sales totaled \$100,000 in donations.

MARK ALAN METZ was born in Huntington in 1959 and grew up in Barboursville. He attended Marshall University for two years, and then transferred to the West Virginia University School of Forestry, where he earned his Master's Degree in Forestry. He was active in the WVU Forestry Club and Xi Sigma Pi National Forestry Honorary. He worked at the West Virginia Division of Forestry from 1985-1990, where much of his time was spent fighting forest fires. He also helped landowners evaluate and improve woodlands and was a strong proponent of detailed written forest management plans. He then founded Mountaineer Forestry Services, which he operated until 2012, when he took a state/federal forester job to help private landowners with non-commercial timber management. He was a founding member of the Woodland Owners of West Virginia. He was a board member for 10 years and president from 2004-2006. The logo he developed for the group is still in use. The "Emergency Forest Restoration Program" practice plan he developed in case of tornado or other disaster is still in use today. He married Becky Patterson in 1991 and they had two daughters. Mr. Metz died in a hunting accident in 2012 at age 53.

ROSCOE KESSLER PLUMLEY was born in Pear, West Virginia in 1924. He served in the U.S. military from 1944 until he was honorably discharged in 1946. He involved himself with agriculture for over 80 years. In 1956, he graduated from West Virginia University (WVU) with a Bachelor of Science degree. He then

worked as a Vocational Agriculture teacher in Raleigh County from 1956 to 1960. There, he helped establish a new Vo-Ag department. Mr. Plumley was instrumental in establishing and equipping a new shop, classroom and school farm. He also served as the WVU 4-H and Extension Agent in Wyoming County for 13 years. Mr. Plumley's organizational efforts resulted in a tripling of the size, number, and participation of 4-H clubs and members in the county. In 1965 he received his Masters in Poultry Production and Science at WVU. After receiving his Masters, Plumley was given permission to assist with poultry in the nine-county Beckley area. There, he started the poultry cooperative in several counties, was responsible for the construction and operation of a cooperative feed mill at Saulsville and helped poultry producers in the area increase efficiency in feed receiving and distribution. Mr. Plumley was married to Ruby Smith Plumley, a retired schoolteacher, and together they had four children. Education was one of the most important things to Mr. Plumley, and he lived by the philosophy that "the basis of all education is reading, writing, and arithmetic. The three R's must be our major emphasis."

JACK STURGILL was born in Norton, Virginia, where he attended school until his enlistment in the U.S. Navy. He served during the Korean War until his honorable discharge in 1955. After his service, he enrolled in the Forestry program at North Carolina State University, where he earned membership in Phi Kappa Phi honorary and was elected president of both the Xi Sigma Pi honorary and the North Carolina State Forestry Club. While at NC State he joined the Society of American Foresters. He married Virginia Roberta Greene in 1958 and four years later settled in Petersburg working for the Westvaco Corporation at the Luke, Maryland, paper manufacturing facility. Mr. Sturgill encouraged and promoted safer harvesting practices, sustainable timber growth activities, and road construction that would meet landowner needs and future forest management goals. To that end, he established a Christmas tree operation near Durbin in Pocahontas County where he showcased the practices he actively encouraged. In 1994 he worked as an international consultant to Serbia, evaluating the possibility of acquiring lumber and establishing a sawmill in central Serbia as part of a joint venture involving West Virginia and Russian firms. He is a charter member and past president of the WV Forestry Association. He was also appointed by the governor to serve on the Board of Directors of the West Virginia Board of Registration for Foresters.

Honey Cucumber Salad

| 3 medium cucumbers, thinly sliced and halved | 1/2 cup white balsamic vinegar, (can also use white wine vinegar) |
| Salt | 1/4 cup water |
| 1/4 cup honey | 2 tablespoons red onion, diced |

Place cucumbers in bowl; sprinkle with salt. Toss and set aside. In small mixing bowl, stir together honey, vinegar, water and red onions. Pour mixture over cucumbers and toss. Allow salad to marinate in the refrigerator about 1 hour prior to serving.

Orange Honey Barbecued Ribs

| 2 tablespoons vegetable oil | 1 tablespoon prepared horseradish |
| 1 cup onion, finely chopped | 1 tablespoon grated orange peel |
| 2 cloves garlic, minced | 3 pounds baby back pork ribs |
| 1 12-ounce bottle chili sauce | |
| 1/3 cup honey | |

In saucepan, heat oil and onions over medium heat; cook until golden brown, about 10 minutes. Stir in garlic; cook until just fragrant. Stir in remaining ingredients except pork. Cover and simmer over very low heat for 5 minutes. Remove from heat. Place ribs in foil-lined baking pan. Spread evenly with 1 cup sauce. Set remaining sauce aside. Cover baking pan with foil and bake at 350°F for 1 hour until ribs are tender and cooked through. Meanwhile, prepare grill with medium-high heat. Transfer cooked ribs to grill; cook, turning frequently until ribs are well browned. Transfer to cutting board. Brush with remaining 1/2 cup sauce; cut and serve. Makes 4 servings.

Honey Watermelon Crush

| 16 ounces watermelon, diced | 16 ounces ice |
| 10 ounces cucumber | 2 sprigs of mint, garnish |
| 6 mint leaves | 16 ounces seedless watermelon, small cubes |
| 4 tablespoons honey | |

Place the diced watermelon, cucumber, mint leaves, honey and ice in the blender and blend on high till you receive a smooth consistency.

To serve, place the small cubes of watermelon into the glass, then pour the blended juice over it, slightly stir and serve with a small spoon.

Garnish with a sprig of mint.

Recipes

Ice Cream Cake

- 1 box yellow cake mix
- 3 large eggs
- 1/3 cup vegetable oil
- 2 quarts ice cream, softened slightly

One hour before starting your cake, turn the freezer to its highest setting.

Heat oven to 350° F. Grease and flour two 8-inch round cake pans.

In a large mixing bowl, combine the cake mix, eggs, and oil, along with the amount of water called for by the package directions. Beat until well combined. Divide the batter between the pans. Place the pans in oven and bake until a toothpick inserted into the center of the cakes comes out clean, about 35 minutes. Allow the cakes to cool for at least 10 minutes before removing them from the pans. Let the layers cool completely before assembling the cake.

Place one of the layers on an 8-inch cardboard cake round or a freezer-proof cake plate. Using a rubber spatula, evenly spread 1 quart of the softened ice cream over the top of the plated layer. Place the remaining cake layer on top of the ice cream. Put the cake in the freezer to harden, about 1 hour.

Transfer the remaining softened ice cream to a mixing bowl. Cream by hand with a rubber spatula until it reaches the consistency of frosting. Frost the top and the sides of the cake with the ice cream.

When the cake is frosted, transfer it to the freezer to harden, about 1 hour. Serve immediately upon removal, using a warm knife to slice.

Congratulations to the Barbour and Monroe County 4-H teams for bringing home National Awards from the 63rd National Land Judging and Homesite Evaluation Contests in Oklahoma City, OK on May 1. Barbour County won first place National Championships in the 4-H Land Judging Contest and the 4-H Homesite Evaluation Contest. Barbour County's program is the only county 4-H land judging program in the nation to win two championships in the same year and this was for the fifth time!! The team was coached by retiree Roger Nestor and Josh Peplowski, WVU Barbour County Extension Agent. Team members were Kelton Miller who placed 1st in Land Judging and 2nd in Homesite; Nathan Yokum was the 2nd place scorer in Land; Chloe Mouser was the 4th place scorer in Homesite; and Mikhela Freeman was also in the top 20.

The Monroe County team coached by Brian Wickline, WVU Monroe County Extension Agent earned a 2nd place Reserve Championship in the 4-H Land Judging Contest and was 3rd in the 4-H Homesite Evaluation Contest. Laura Dransfield placed 8th in Land Judging; and Brian Young and Alison Bartenslager also placed in the top 10. Congratulations to the 4-H'ers, their coaches, parents, and donors for their support!

Congratulations also to Monroe County

for winning the Mid-America Grassland Competition. The 15th annual event was sponsored by the Missouri Forage and Grassland Council, in cooperation with the Missouri Department of Conservation, University of Missouri Extension and the USDA - Natural Resources Conservation Service June 3-4, 2014 in Springfield, Missouri. The contest was divided into four sections: 1) soils interpretation; 2) plant identification; 3) grassland condition, and 4) wildlife habitat. The participants were divided into 4 groups and rotated through all four sections at 25-minute intervals. The goal of the contest is to educate students in the benefits, use and management of grasslands for livestock production and wildlife habitat. Team members were Ty Wickline, Josh Dransfield, Lance Wilson, and Thomas Willis and the team was coached by WVU Extension Agent, Brian Wickline. Congratulations!!!

Berkeley County 4-H Junior and Senior Division Horse Judging teams received top honors at the State 4-H and FFA Horse Judging Contest held April 26, at Potomac State College of WVU. Ninety-four 4-H and FFA members vied for top honors to represent their respective county/chapter at each organization's national contest. The contest consisted of 4 halter and 3 performance classes with senior youth presenting 2 oral reasons presentations and

junior contestants presenting 1 set of oral reasons. This event is designed to provide youth participants with the opportunity to develop critical thinking, leadership, teamwork, evaluation, communication, and decision-making skills, in addition to being able to recognize good conformation, breed character, and performance ideals in different breeds of horses and defend their selection through learning to speak clearly and convincingly through the presentation of oral reasons. In the Junior 4-H Competition, Berkeley County A team placed first with members Hope Adams, Julia O'Neill, Hope Damon, and Brianna Lilly, and Coach, Cheryl Lynch. The 2nd place Junior team from Grant County was Hope Aristidou, Kristin Duncan, Satori Paoli, and Catherine Byard, and Coach Clarissa Crites; and the 3rd place Junior team from Berkeley County B was Ashley Ritt, Essence Heflin, Bethanie Bowers, and Abbey Brumbaugh, and Coach Cheryl Lynch. In the Senior 4-H Division, Berekeley County B placed first consisting of 4-H members Kimberly Hutton, Kaitlin Foster, Aislinn Rutledge, and Sophie Walker, and Coach Shannon Walker. The 2nd place Senior team from Berkeley County A was Elizabeth Lynch, Austin Cline, Julie Hormes, Samantha Mudge, and Coach Cheryl Lynch; and the 3rd place Senior team from Hampshire County was Gina Ott, Samantha Stokes, Amanda Twigg, and Coach Heather Shaffer. The winning senior 4-H team will represent WV at the Eastern National 4-H Horse Roundup on November 7-9, 2014 in Louisville, KY.

Junior show exhibitors (4-H and FFA members) at the State Fair will be competing in Dept F activities in Market Steers/Heifers, Feeder Steers, Beef Heifers, Dairy Cattle, Market Lamb, Purebred Sheep, Market Hog, Purebred Swine, Market Goats, and Horse shows and skillathon competitions. Roane County High School constructs new high tunnel to bolster Ag programs

This year, Roane County High School received a grant for the construction of a high tunnel, a greenhouse-like structure where crops are planted directly into the soil under a plastic covered roof to allow for extension season, in order to bolster the school's agricultural program and further improve the school's Farm to School program. The school's new high tunnel will create more planting space for students and gives them a moisture and temperature controlled environment. According to Roane County agricultural student Emily Higginbotham, the high tunnel "gives the plants a little bit of protection and lets us plant earlier in the season or later if we need to." The high tunnel will also provide more space for vocational agriculture students to complete their SAE (Supervised Agricultural Experience) projects. Emily expects the high tunnel to pique student and community interest in locally grown fruits and vegetables.

Regional WV Farm to School AmeriCorp (WV Department of Education's Office of Child Nutrition sponsors the AmeriCorps for the WV Farm to School program) Member Lisa Minney is credited for drafting the grant and working out details of ordering the structure as part of her work with local WVU-Roane County Extension Agent Brandy Brabham.

Brabham says, "The construction of this high tunnel will not only improve the local Farm to School program, but would also allow students to access other markets by working with groups like the recently formed regional growers cooperative known as Mid Ohio Valley Edibles (MOVE). Some students worked with MOVE last year to sell to schools, local restaurants, and other institutions. Brabham also noted that the WV Farm to School program has made 10 paid

Danny Cummings, an Ag teacher at Roane County High School, explained that the 30x48 foot high tunnel will be mainly used to grow lettuce and tomatoes for the school's consumption as part of the agricultural experience program for FFA students. Students will grow the plants in raised beds beginning in the fall, when the construction of the high tunnel is expected to be completed. Mr. Cummings credits the students for the construction of the high tunnel saying, "The students are doing all of the work. They came out and surveyed the land, put up the bows for the greenhouse, and will put the sides on." Students will have many learning opportunities in the high tunnel in the future, as well, according to Cummings. "The high tunnel will be incorporated into the school's vocational agriculture curriculum through production, marketing, and management hands-

youth memberships to MOVE available to interested students who have agricultural products that they are interested in selling to the schools, local restaurants, or other institutions in the region. Students interested in learning more about marketing with MOVE are asked to call the local Extension office at 304-927-0975.

The Farm to School program is only in its beginning stages in Roane County, yet Roane County High School senior Callie Moles says that the program has already been met with "a large positive response from students and the school." Primarily, she says, the Farm to School program produces tomatoes, cucumbers, peppers, and other basic vegetables for consumption, though she expects the program to continue growing and expanding in the years to come, particularly with the construction of the new high tunnel.

USDA RESUMES JULY CATTLE SURVEY AND REPORT

This July, the U.S. Department of Agriculture's National Agricultural Statistics Service (NASS) will fully reinstate its Cattle program by surveying nearly 10,000 cattle operations nationwide to provide an up-to-date measure of U.S. cattle inventories.

Reduced in March 2013 to an annual program, NASS will resume the semiannual Cattle program with both the July and January surveys and Cattle reports.

"In January, NASS reported that the cattle and calves inventory in the United States was the lowest since 1951 at 82.1 million head," said West Virginia State Statistician Seth Riggins.

"Reinstating the July Cattle survey and report could not come at a better time. This timely information will serve as a critical decision-making tool for producers and the entire agriculture industry."

During the first two weeks of July, West Virginia producers will have the opportunity to report their beef and dairy cattle inventories, calf crop and cattle on feed operations. To make it as easy as possible for producers to participate in the survey, NASS offers the option of responding via the internet, telephone, mail, or a personal interview with a local NASS representative.

"There is a need for more current data and NASS is aiming to fill that need

by resuming the July Cattle survey and report," Riggins explained. "These data help producers make timely, informed marketing decisions and plan for herd expansion or reduction. It also helps packers and government officials evaluate expected slaughter volume for future months and determine potential supplies."

As is the case with all NASS surveys, information provided by respondents is confidential by law.

Two Putnam County Elementary Farm to School Programs Flourishing

The Farm to School effort is alive and well in Putnam County. Several schools have been growing food in their high tunnels and selling it back to the local school system. Hometown Elementary has only had their high tunnel for a few months, but they have already sold hundreds of dollars' worth to their kitchen staff. They've also donated some of the vegetables they grow to the local men's shelter in Charleston. The WVDA recently visited the school and on that day, 18.5 pounds of green onions, 4.5 pounds of turnips, and 9 pounds of radishes were harvested.

George Washington Elementary in Eleanor has had their high tunnel for two years and have also added a new picnic shelter beside the greenhouse so they can munch on their vegetables outside. They recently showed off their homegrown efforts at their Leadership Day. Kindergarteners walked visitors through their growing process and 5th graders showed visitors through the beautiful, open high tunnel. Each grade has a designated bed to grow their vegetables, but they say it's a group effort growing things to make money for their school. Putnam County continues to look for even more Farm to School involvement next school year.
